

# 2021 GUIDE TO FIGHTING HUMAN TRAFFICKING IN ARIZONA

Hey friend,

**Thank you so much for getting this guide!** We are so encouraged whenever someone takes a step, like you did, to help survivors of this horrible abuse.

**Fifteen years ago we found a 13-year-old girl being trafficked for sex on 51st Avenue and McDowell in Phoenix.**

It was horrifying and infuriating. Honestly, we were an emotional train wreck for days and kept asking...

*How in the world can something like this happen to this kid?*

*Who is this little girl and how did she end up here?*

*Who is this guy doing this to her and WHEN is he going to be arrested and thrown in jail?*

**We found out that she was a runaway. She was a foster kid and had no parents. This 29-year-old guy found her and started selling her for sex.**

We worked with the police to bring her to the Phoenix Dream Center, an inner-city program we run that serves at-risk youth. Once we got her safe, we started building a program around her to help her heal in all the areas she needed healing.

**It was a lot of sleepless nights (for her and for us). We would sit with her for hours and just hold her hand while she shook and cried.**

There is SO MUCH we could share about that first experience we had serving her. We learned a LOT. But for now, we'll just share that our human trafficking recovery programs have now served over 931 young women age 18 to 26 and over 1,543 children age 11 to 17. We remember every precious face, every sleepless night.

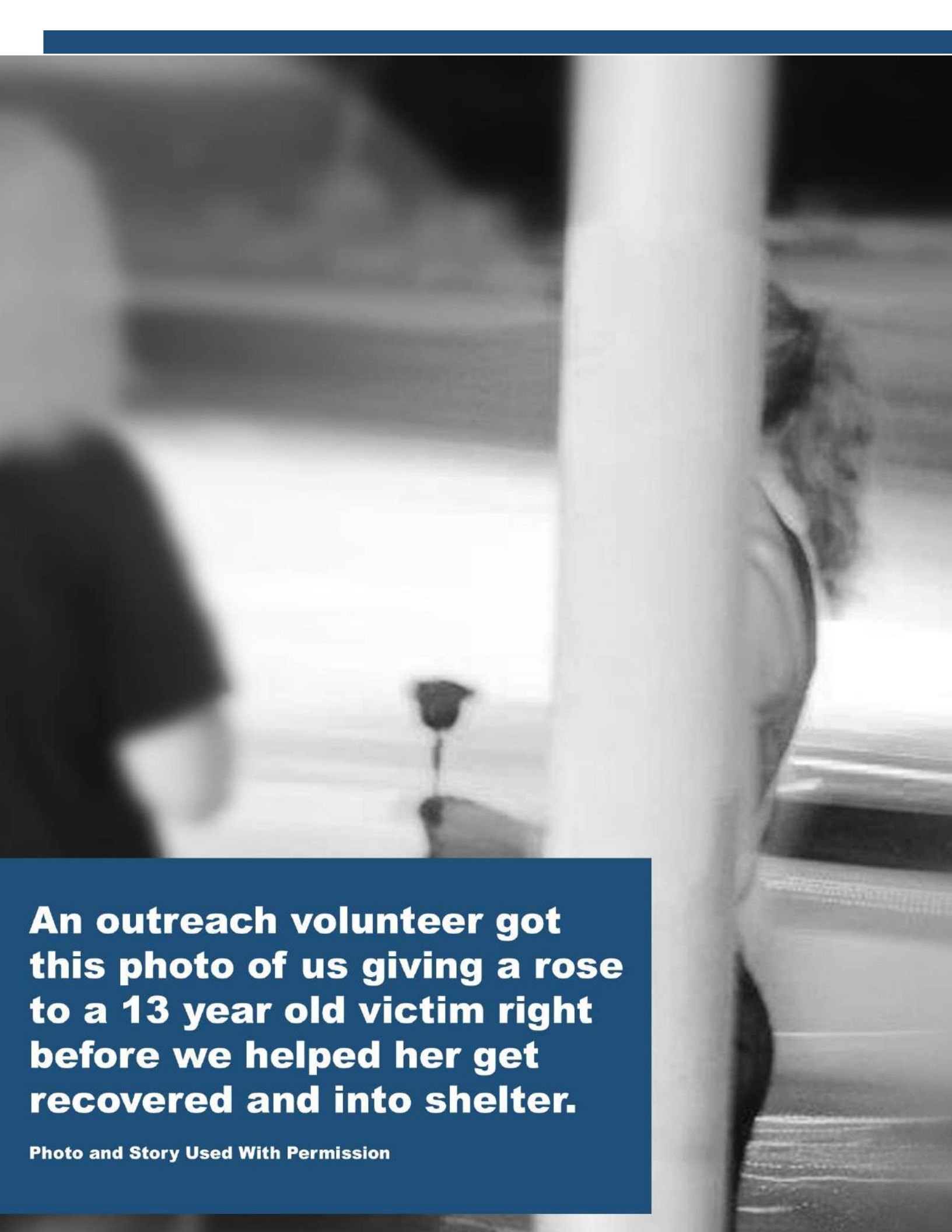
But there's so much more work to do and we're glad you're helping with that work.

**Our goal now is to help people just like YOU on your journey to help these victims.**

We were already on our journey to reach out to inner-city, at-risk youth when we found that first little girl. We knew the youth in our community had struggles with drugs and gangs. But honestly, it was the first time we had heard about human trafficking. It wasn't something that anyone in social services was talking about at that time.

**Our journey to learn about human trafficking was fairly typical.** At first we thought it was a faraway issue, still sad, but far away and accessible mostly in pictures and movies.

But after a few hours, then days, then weeks of researching we were horrified to learn that trafficking was not only real but it was alive and well right here in the states. **And then the day came when we read an article in the Arizona Republic about a sting that had happened. To our horror there were DOZENS OF LOCAL CHILDREN who were caught up in the middle of it.** Our world of serving at-risk youth was turned on its head.

We remember being shocked and then saddened for days. We thought, it's happening here, to girls we may have known or seen on some of our outreaches to troubled youth.

**Our rose-colored glasses came off, and so did the gloves. The sadness had turned to anger.**

We wanted to DO SOMETHING. So, we started searching for ways we could help, get involved, donate or advocate or...something....

**We have to admit, it wasn't as easy as we thought to get involved with organizations who are in the human trafficking fight.** Some of them, understandably, have high security, privacy or other concerns and so they don't exactly broadcast what they do or how someone like us could get involved.

Others were relatively new on the scene. They didn't really have the advertising budget to get the word out for opportunities or needs they have.

Regardless of why, it was difficult to find opportunities.

So as we began to build what has now become the largest human trafficking recovery program in North America, we learned a LOT about helping the girls and we put most of it in in this guide. **This guide is our reflection of nearly 15 years of seeing how best to volunteer, serve and help trafficking survivors.**



It's our hope that people who want to get involved with organizations in the human trafficking fight would find this guide useful and that the organizations themselves would get the support they so desperately need.



We've also tried hard NOT to include any information that can compromise any of the organizations in any way, especially the safety of the clients they serve.

For example, in some cases things like addresses or number of human trafficking clients they serve was not included if the organization specifically did not want it disclosed.

We have no doubt that some parts of the information in here has or will change because the nature of human trafficking organizations always seems

to be changing due to staff turnover, loss or increase of grant funding or change of organizational vision.

**None-the-less, we know that for any of you who genuinely want to get involved and make a difference, this information will give you a better head start than we ever had.**

## Volunteering At Human Trafficking Organizations

Along with the work we did at our own human trafficking program we also volunteered at several human trafficking organizations and the experiences were very positive. But we've had some friends who've shared some challenges they've had. **We wanted to share some of the lessons we've learned and some that our friends shared with us in hopes that you can have the best experience when you volunteer.**

**Listen, you SHOULD volunteer!** We don't think you'll ever regret it especially if you know what you're getting into. Very few nonprofits have excessive budget for staffing so they rely heavily on volunteers. **But you should know there may be some challenges in the process.**

For example, if you're volunteering with a one-off group you may not need to go through the background check process. But if you do have to do a background check, here's what it might look like.

**First, keep in mind that it may take some time to process your application.** And in the case of some of the shelters there may be an extensive background check that will take some time. **We've learned that it can cost the nonprofit between \$17 and \$50 to do this background**



**check on you.** The nonprofit will probably cover it but we made a donation after we learned that. I'd recommend you do too.

If the shelter works with children you may even hear the volunteer coordinator talk about a Department of Public Safety Fingerprint Clearance Card. It sounds a lot scarier than it is. **If you have to get one it will cost the nonprofit around \$70.** It's nice if they pay for it, but if you have the means to do it yourself please pay for it or give them a donation. The Fingerprint Clearance Card will be yours to keep and will go with you long after you volunteer with that nonprofit, even to another nonprofit that requires it.

**Again, you should plan on the volunteer application and approval process taking some time.** This isn't the nonprofit being slow or rude or anything like that. Most of the time they have grants, permits or legal requirements they have to conform to when it comes to volunteers. We worked in the administration office of a shelter that had children and it would often be a 4 to 6 week process of background checks and state required mandatory trainings before the volunteers could even set foot in the building. **Don't take it personal it's just part of the process.**

**Here's what I suggest you do while you're waiting on the application process.**

*Take your time and be patient*

While you're waiting for the background check or fingerprint clearance or similar, sign up for the organization's newsletter, make a small donation, go on a tour, attend an open house, go to a gala or fundraiser, do some research or follow, comment and like their stuff on Facebook. You'll learn a lot and you'll be even more informed when you do start. We cleaned out my mom's closet the weekend before we started volunteering and brought bags of clothes our first day at one of the centers. We were pretty popular that day.

**Once you get the green light, celebrate!** You deserve it and you've crossed a threshold that few others have – you made it through the long and sometimes daunting process of applying to volunteer with a nonprofit that serves human trafficking survivors.

The nonprofit will most likely have some type of orientation, shadowing day or training event. We've never found one that didn't offer something.

As you begin volunteering, here's a checklist of things that will help you in your first days.

## 1. Know that safety comes first.

There are a few health and safety precautions you should always take when volunteering at a nonprofit that serves human trafficking survivors. We did some missions work overseas and we had to get inoculations for communicable diseases. Most Phoenix nonprofits won't require that, but some will ask you to get your TB test and in some rare cases you may have to get a physical.

If you will be working around donations at all, we suggest you wear closed-toed shoes, preferably ones that are comfortable, as you will likely be on your feet a lot. Tie your hair back, wear a headscarf/bandana, or be ready to wear a hairnet if you are working in their kitchen. Be prepared to wear food-service gloves if you're working with food and remove your rings. **Some nonprofits will have strict dress codes, it's best to plan to simplify your attire, at least at first.**

Wash your hands and use hand sanitizer before and after your shift and using the restroom. **Most importantly, do not go if you're sick.** Many clients are very vulnerable to germs and diseases - even your little colds could have a big impact on them. **And for your own health's sake,**

**bulk up on vitamins and over the counter cold prevention medications.**

## **2. Remember you are not in charge.**

Show up wanting to know how you can help, and be flexible. One of our supervisors told us one time, **“blessed are the flexible, they shall not be bent out of shape”** it was some of the best advice we ever got. This doesn't mean you won't eventually work into a more desirable or specialized role, but be patient with the process. **You may head up your own company or have decades of experience in your personal or professional life, but this is not your operation to run.** Helping out could mean many things, so be open.

You may be tasked with office work, wake-up duty, opening boxes, sorting produce, organizing, washing, or cleaning besides actually working directly with the clients. Be humble and don't try to run the show. A friend of ours tells us it helps to have a “no task is beneath me” attitude.



The nonprofit may also have rules about giving gifts to clients, letting clients use your phone, transporting them in your car, taking pictures of them or with them, holding their babies or even hugging them. Some of these rules may sound silly or restrictive but realize it's for your safety and the safety of the client. For example, some clients in human trafficking shelters are on the run from some pretty bad characters and a post on social media could be all the trafficker needs to find her. **Respect the rules and realize there's usually a historical reason and it's usually due to safety.**

### 3. Consider the many ways to give.

Maybe you can't make it to volunteer in person and that's perfectly fine. Some nonprofit will have advocacy work for you to do from home. Remotely taking phone calls, answering emails, making social media posts or something similar is actually really important to nonprofit. But you can also donate money or in-kind goods to the nonprofit or organize a fund or donation drive at your work or school.


### 4. Go when you're really needed.

Nonprofits usually get inundated with volunteer help at the holidays, especially holidays like Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter. It's great to help out then, but honestly they need even more help all the other days of the year. **Offer to help out with birthday parties, graduations, baby**

**showers or other non-holiday days.** You'll really be able to give and feel the love on these other days too.

While you're at it, consider making a personal or stated length of time commitment. **People who run the nonprofits really appreciate volunteers who already know how everything works and can get started right when they show up.**

**Consistency is key, especially in nonprofits who serve human trafficking survivors.** As tempting as it is to overcommit, please don't do it unless you really can come through. Start slow and grow into your new role over time.

## 5. Measure your success and effectiveness carefully.

**Don't expect to see outward signs of gratitude or even to be thanked right away.** Most of the clients are dealing with severe trauma and it can take months or years for them to get "out of their own head".

**Remember that you're not there to make yourself feel better - you're there to help human trafficking survivors who are in very challenging circumstances.** This may feel a little emotionally rough at times, but ultimately this kind of work is very rewarding. When faced with a need like this, it's always better to roll up your sleeves and pitch in than to look away.

**We're just going to go ahead and say it - be prepared for cursing, spitting, pushing, yelling, backstabbing, screaming, and other forms of outbursts that are completely understandable and to be expected from teenage girls with trauma.**

**ESPECIALLY teenage girls who have severe and complex trauma.** Even among the young adult shelters some of the clients have arrested development meaning that the young women essentially stopped developing their emotion regulation and coping skills at the age when the trauma and abuse first began. **So if a 20 year old's abuse and trauma**



**started when she was 12 years old, she may react to certain situations as a 12 year old would.**

**You may occasionally take bad days home with you but please don't take it personal.** Of course, you may never see any of this at the nonprofit you volunteer with. But if you do don't be surprised.

**We've found that it's really not a commentary on the nonprofit but rather on the level of trauma that their clients are going through.** We've found that, in general, the younger the human trafficking survivor is the harder it is to work with them and the more trauma-induced outbursts you may face. And human trafficking survivors who are a little older or who have babies are generally a little easier to work with because the abuse isn't as recent and they've at least started down the healing path.

## **6. Leave your pity at the door.**

**Don't come with the attitude that you are a more privileged than the trafficking survivors you are working with.** You are there to be of service to them and to help them, which is a very different approach. **Remember, pity is felt towards another person but compassion is felt with them.**

Share a smile and welcome words. Listen to their stories. **And keep in mind that not everyone who falls victim to human trafficking is or was homeless or had a bad life before being trafficked.** Some even came out of very good families but they need the intensive care the nonprofit offers.

## 7. Consider going with a friend.

**You may want to go with a friend - especially the first time and especially if coming face to face with human trafficking is not something you're used to.** The challenge with helping those in need is to be open to them without being overwhelmed by the suffering you might encounter while doing so.

Having a friend to process your experience with will not only help in sorting through everything, but it will also help you both to be more open, stronger, and of service whenever and wherever you encounter the need.

**Making commitments as a team together will also help if you aren't able to make it to one of your scheduled times.** Remember, consistency is key with human trafficking survivors.

## 8. Compassion fatigue, burnout and secondary traumatic stress.

**Volunteering at human trafficking shelters was both the most difficult and the most rewarding thing I've ever done.** Compassion fatigue or secondary traumatic stress is the emotional stress that results when you hear about the firsthand trauma experiences of human trafficking survivors. **Yes, you will be changed by this experience.**

You may not even recognize you have it but symptoms often include a combination of mental, behavioral, emotional, and physical signs. It may feel like you're abnormally short tempered, stressed or emotionally unsettled and it may also involve a spiritual component such as questioning meaning or loss of faith.

**Here are 16 Key's to staying mentally and emotionally healthy that we pulled from one of the nonprofit's websites.**

- **Life balance** – work to establish and maintain a diversity of interests, activities and relationships.
- **Relaxation techniques** – ensure downtime by practicing meditation or some other form of relaxation.
- **Contact with nature** – garden or hike to remain connected and grounded to the moment can help maintain perspective.

- **Creative expression** – things like drawing, cooking, or photography expand emotional experiences.
- **Assertiveness training** – learn to be able to say “no” and to set limits when necessary.
- **Interpersonal communication skills** – improve written and verbal communication to enhance social and professional support.
- **Cognitive restructuring** – regularly evaluate experiences and apply problem-solving techniques to challenges.
- **Time management** – set priorities and remain productive and effective.
- **Plan for coping** – determine skills and strategies to adopt or enhance when signs of compassion fatigue begin to surface.
- **Focus on self-care** – making a healthy diet, exercise, and regular sleep priorities reduces adverse stress effects.
- **Journal** – writing about feelings related to helping or care giving and about anything that has helped or been comforting can help make meaning out of negative experiences.
- **Seek professional support** – working with a counselor who specializes in trauma to process distressing symptoms and experiences provides additional perspectives and ideas.



- **Join a support group** – talking through experiences and coping strategies with others who have similar circumstances can enhance optimism and hope.
- **Learn new self-care strategies** – adopting a new stress management technique such as yoga or progressive muscle relaxation can reduce adverse physical stress symptoms.
- **Ask for help** – asking social supports or co-workers to assist with tasks or responsibilities can hasten healing.
- **Recognize success and create meaning** – identifying aspects of helping that have been positive and important to others assists with resolving trauma and distress.

**Again, you SHOULD volunteer.**

We've met trafficking survivors and staff while we were volunteering, some of them have become life-long friends. **Being a part of someone's journey of healing and restoration is one of the most amazing things to be a part of.**

# Donating To Human Trafficking Organizations

Perhaps the only thing we recommend more than volunteering at a nonprofit is **DONATING to one**. We've never seen a nonprofit be wasteful with the funds they have. If anything, they stretch things farther than we could have ever imagined.

It's a good investment and no matter how you divide it up MOST of the money you give actually does go to help the clients directly. There's usually a really good tax benefit to you too so take advantage of it if you can. **But before you can donate to a nonprofit you need to choose one!**

We highly recommend checking out any nonprofit's profile on **GuideStar**. You will see their mission statement, how long they've been around, their financials and their general standing as a nonprofit.

Here are the 10 Tips from GuideStar on what to look for in donating to a nonprofit.

## 1. Researching Charities

*do your research first*

- Clarify your values.
- Do this before you open your checkbook, volunteer your time, or look at that letter from a charity.

## **2. Identify your preferences.**

- Ask yourself: "What is important to me?" Human Trafficking? Education? Hunger? Helping sick children?
- Where should the charity do its work—in your neighborhood, region, the nation, or internationally?
- Ask yourself if you want to support a large or small charity, a new or an old one.

## **3. Search the GuideStar database.**

- Find charities that meet your criteria.
- Check out the other details offered by GuideStar

## **4. Focus on the mission.**

- Look at each charity's description in the GuideStar search results, on its Web site, or in its literature.
- Find the nonprofit that fit best with your values.

## **5. Eliminate organizations that don't meet your criteria.**

- Now you're ready to look more closely at these organizations.

## **6. Check a charity's legitimacy.**

- If you find a nonprofit on GuideStar with our Basic Search, you know the IRS recognizes the organization as tax exempt. (GuideStar

Premium and GuideStar Pro include information on defunct organizations, but those profiles are clearly marked.)

- If the charity is not on GuideStar, ask to see its letter of determination.
- If the organization is faith based, ask to see its official listing in a directory for its denomination.

## **7. Get the cold, hard facts. A reputable organization will:**

- Define its mission and programs clearly.
- Have measurable goals.
- Use concrete criteria to describe its achievements.

## **8. Compare apples to apples.**

- Be sure to compare charities that do the same kind of work, especially if you're looking at their finances. The type of work a charity does can affect its operating costs dramatically.

## **9. Avoid charities that won't share information or pressure you.**

### **Reputable Nonprofits:**

- Will discuss their programs and finances.
- Don't use pressure tactics.
- Are willing to send you literature about their work or direct you to a Web site.
- Will take "no" for an answer.



## 10. Trust your instincts.

- If you still have doubts about a charity, don't contribute to it. Instead, find another nonprofit that does the same kind of work and with which you feel comfortable, then make your donation.

When you are ready to give to a nonprofit there are several ways you can do so, beyond just hitting the Donate button. **Here are 7 Alternative Ideas for Donating to a Nonprofit that we found on one of the nonprofit's websites.**

### 1. Make a Cash Contribution

Charities are more than happy to take cash contributions from donors. **If you're looking for a no-fuss way to reduce your tax liability while also supporting your favorite charity, consider simply writing a check to the nonprofit organization of your choice.** You can designate how the funds you share are to be used, or you can make a no strings attached gift that enables the group's executive director or Board of Directors make a decision about how the money should be spent to serve the best interests of the organization.

### 2. Attend a Fundraiser

**If you want to have fun while also supporting your favorite charity, consider buying a ticket to attend an enjoyable fundraiser event.**

Many nonprofit hold silent auctions, wine and food tastings, dinner dances, and other events throughout the year in order to raise money. It makes sense to put your entertainment dollars to work to provide support for the work of important community-based charities, especially when you can have a good time in the process!

### 3. Clean Out Your Closets and Share

**There's a good chance that you have plenty of items in your closet that you'll never wear again.** Whether its clothes that you've outgrown or items that you just don't wear anymore, the very items that are causing clutter in your closet could be put to good use by a nonprofit organization.

Some donations are offered for sale in thrift stores operated by nonprofits while others are given to needy individuals and families in the community for their own personal use. Contact a local charitable organization in your area that accept clothing items to inquire about the best way to make your donation. **It's likely that you'll be asked to take the items that you would like to share to a donation drop-off site.**

## 4. Donating Household Goods

**One of the ways you can donate on a regular basis is by giving household goods and supplies you no longer need.** If you replace your home's furniture, and your existing furniture is still in good condition, donate it. Appliances, cookware and home decor items are also acceptable donations.

Many of these organizations pass these donated goods on to those in need. In other cases, the charity will sell the goods to the public and use the funds received as a way to fund the charity. The same organizations that accept clothing are likely to accept household goods.

## 5. Donate Your Time and Talent

**Another way to give donations to nonprofit organizations is to donate your time and your talent.** You may be able to donate your legal expertise to the organization or offer time helping to run charity events. You can donate your accounting services or your crafting abilities. Smaller organizations often need these services the most. Larger organizations have full management to provide these services, but locally run charities may not. Contact local organizations to find out how you can help.

## 6. Donate a Vehicle That You No Longer Need

Do you have an old car, boat, or recreational vehicle that you no longer use? You can convert automobiles and other types of vehicles into tax deductions simply by giving them to qualified charitable entities. In addition to enjoying the tax benefits, you'll get these large items out of your own way and reduce ownership expenses such as vehicle registration and insurance coverage fees. **While not all nonprofits accept vehicle donations, there's a good chance that one or more organizations in your area would love to take what you want to give away off your hands.**

## 7. Pledge Support to a Walk or Run Participant

**Many of these human trafficking nonprofit organizations hold walk or run events as a way to raise money and increase awareness of their work in the community.** They recruit people to participate in the event, and participants are responsible for enlisting financial support from donors. If you're looking for a way to keep your tax liability in check, consider agreeing to sponsor someone who is participating in this type of fundraiser for an organization that does work that you'd like to support.

While many types of nonprofits hold these types of events, they seem to be particularly popular among healthcare charities.

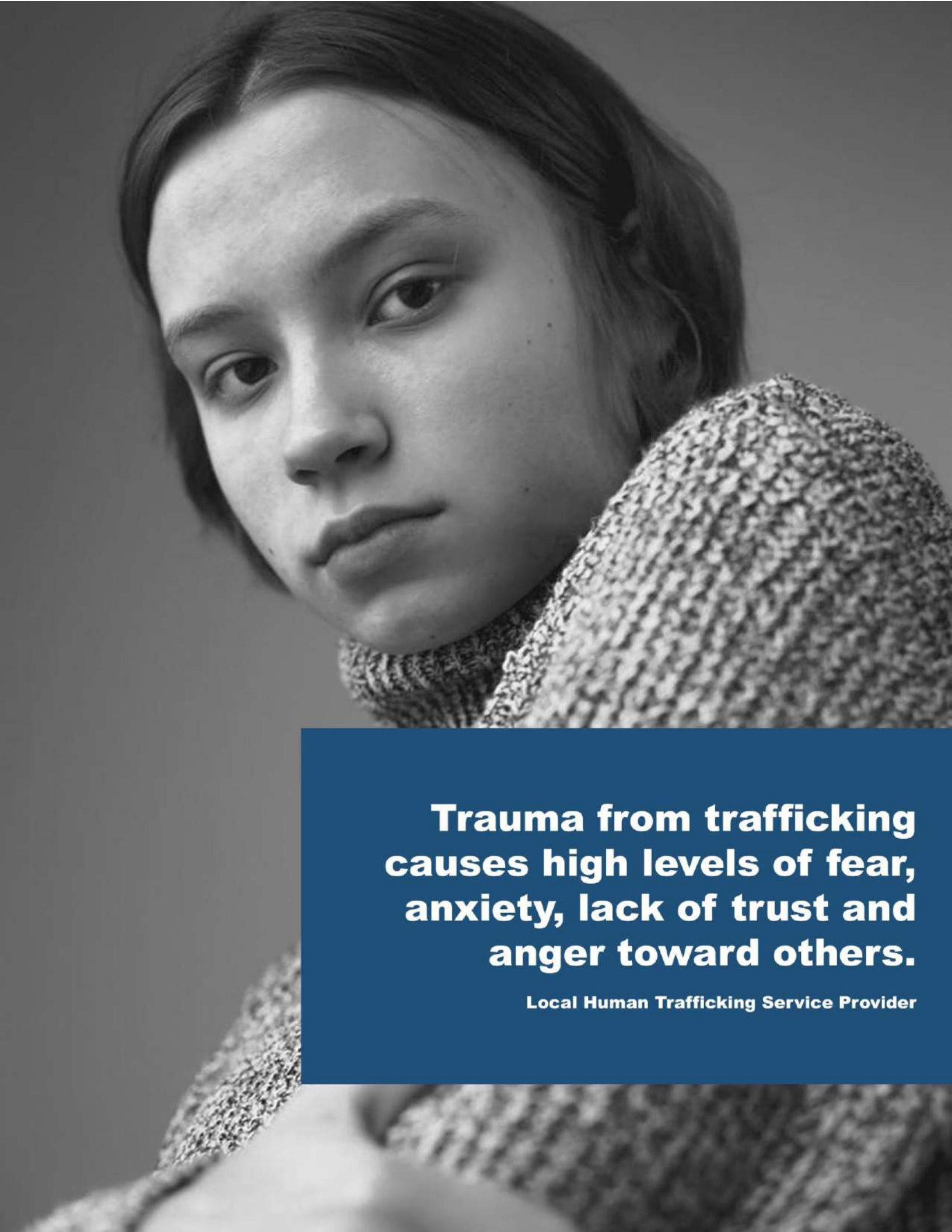
## A Word On Tax Deductions And Donations

Nonprofit organizations regularly receive tax breaks from the federal government because these organizations are operating on a not for profit basis. Individuals who donate to those organizations may also receive tax deductions on their federal income taxes for the donation of goods and cash. If you are a professional who donates his or her time to an organization, this may be a write off for your business, too.

**In Arizona there are hundreds of nonprofits that also qualify for a state tax credit, which is a dollar for dollar credit toward your state taxes.** In each organizational overview below I've listed the Qualifying Charitable Organization or Qualifying Foster Care Organization number.

To find out more about the qualifications of your charitable donations for tax benefits, contact a tax professional. Donations of goods and cash will require a receipt from the charity documenting your gift. Whenever you donate at least \$250, or goods valued at this much in any year, be sure you have the proper documentation to support it.

Now that you're a little more informed about doing some good at a human trafficking organization, it's time to look at 42 local options for you.

# Human Trafficking Organizations Overview

To help you get a perspective of the local organizations around Phoenix we've broken this part of the guide up into 3 categories. **Some of these organizations exclusively focus on human trafficking and offer “specific or specialized” human trafficking services.** Some of the organizations we've listed don't have services exclusively for human trafficking survivors, but they have “integrated” the care in with the other shelter services they offer.

**For the purpose of helping you get started on volunteering or donating, we've included them both in this guide.**

But whether the nonprofit exclusively focuses on human trafficking or not, all of the nonprofits listed here have human trafficking as part of their focus, even if it's not their exclusive focus.

As we mentioned in the beginning, human trafficking service providers are always changing. **The goal here was to give you a head start on volunteering or donating to some really great human trafficking organizations.**

## **Housing and Shelter Organizations (22 organizations)**

These are organizations that actually in-take girls, boys, young men and/or women into their facilities and provide housing, shelter and healing services to them.

## **Service Provider Organizations (12 organizations)**

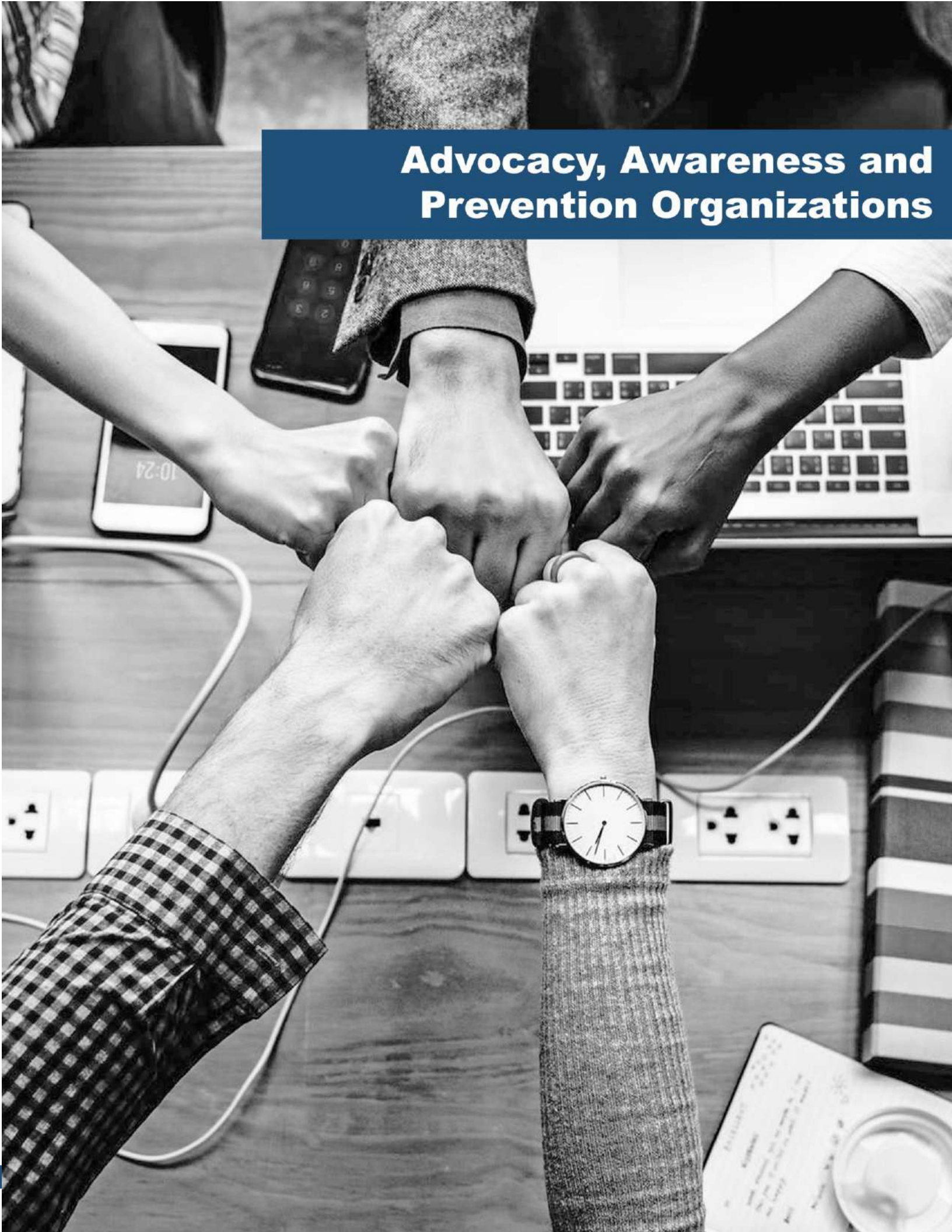
